Listening and responding appropriately	 Listen carefully and respond with increasing appropriateness to what has been said. Fully understand instructions with more than one point in many situations and independently seek clarification when a message is not clear. Attempt to follow instructions before seeking assistance. Listen to others and begin to summarise some of the main points. Express characters' thoughts and feelings in imaginative play and uses words and phrases appropriate words, phrases and sentences.
Ask and answer questions	 Show that they are following a conversation by asking relevant and timely questions. Answer questions using clear sentences. Begin to give reasoning behind their answers when prompted to do so. Show interest and ask lots of questions to find out specific information.
Speaking clearly for a range of purposes and audiences	 Talk about themselves clearly and confidently. Verbally recount experiences with some added interesting details and clarity, beginning to make connections between ideas or thoughts. Offer ideas based on what has been heard. Use more complicated grammar to explain or justify opinion. Know that they need to use different styles of talk with different people. Speak in a way that is clear and easy to understand. Demonstrate good phonic knowledge by clearly pronouncing the sounds within words. Identify syllables within words. Give just enough detail to keep the audience engaged.

Using vocabulary and using Standard English	 Use subject-specific vocabulary to explain, describe and add detail. Suggest words or phrases appropriate to the topic being discussed. Start to vary language according to the situation between formal and informal. Usually speak in grammatically correct sentences. Ask for the meaning of unknown words. Use newly introduced topic words appropriately in a sentence. Use speech that is consistently easy to understand and clear.
Drama and performance	 Speak confidently within a group of peers so that their message is clear. Practise and rehearse reading sentences and stories aloud. Take on a different role in a drama or role play and discuss the character's feelings, taking on some characteristics and/or the voice of the character being played. Recognise that sometimes speakers talk differently and discuss reasons why this might happen.
Participating in discussions	 Give enough detail to hold the interest of other participant(s) in a discussion. Engage in and contribute to meaningful discussions that relate to different topic areas and is uses some imaginative and adventurous vocabulary. Remain focused on a discussion when not directly involved and recall the main points when questioned. Take turns to talk, listening carefully to the contributions of others. Vary language between formal and informal according to the situation. Add humour to a discussion or debate where appropriate.
